Ongoing Initiatives

» Naturalization Test Redesign

The Office of Citizenship is revising the naturalization test to increase both uniformity and meaningfulness of the testing process. The Office of Citizenship has commissioned studies to determine the current test's pass/fail rate and to evaluate the internal and external impacts of a change in the test. Learning from these studies and from ongoing communication with expert communities and internal and external stakeholders, the Office of Citizenship is committed to creating a test that is fair and meaningful, and which serves as an instrument of civic learning. The content and testing procedures of the new test are scheduled to be finalized in 2007. Once the new test is finalized, applicants will have one year to prepare for the new test, which will be implemented in 2008. The Office of Citizenship will develop a series of educational products to assist in the test preparation process.

Community Outreach Efforts

The Office of Citizenship plays an important role in communicating with stakeholders and immigrant communities across the country. Outreach efforts are led at the grassroots level by Community Liaison Officers, who are currently located in 19 cities from Los Angeles, CA to New York, NY.




Community Liaison Officers serve as the public face of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services and the Office of Citizenship. These outreach specialists maintain continuous contact with stakeholders in an effort to keep the immigrant community informed and assist in efforts to promote civic literacy and immigrant integration. Community Liaison Officers also work closely with state and local officials in supporting the needs of the immigrant community.

Additionally, these officers coordinate citizenship forums, special naturalization ceremonies, town hall meetings, and related events designed to elicit community support for the effective implementation of integration and civic literacy activities. Events are closely coordinated with a robust network of local and regional stakeholders.

Perfect for individual study or for use in the classroom, the Civics Flash Cards serve as a valuable instruction tool for naturalization test preparation.


